UNIVERSITY AREA CDC

The University Area Community Development Corporation Inc. (University Area CDC) is a 501(c) (3) public/private partnership whose mission is children and family development, crime prevention, and commerce growth. Its primary focus is the redevelopment and sustainability of the at-risk areas surrounding the Tampa campus of the University of South Florida.

The University Area CDC operates out of the University Area Community Center Complex, a 50,000 square foot multi-purpose building that serves as the focal point of the neighborhood. We work to improve the economic, educational and social levels of the community through adult & youth programs, educational courses and resource assistance services. Funds provided through grants, private contributions and public appropriations help thousands of residents participate in most programs free of charge.

The University Area is identified as "economically disadvantaged" (2013 Census) and literally has third world level health outcomes. Of the 7,000 families in the area, 96% are classified as "extremely low income" by the Housing Authority of Tampa-Hillsborough County. Many are members of the "working poor" families whose annual gross income is \$10,000. 98% of children qualify for free or reduced lunch and at least 8% of elementary students are reported homeless (Mort Elementary School, 2015).

University Area residents are at high risk for, but not limited to, hypertension, diabetes, obesity (adult/child), and cancer. Coupled with these health risks, this community is marred by illiteracy, high -school dropout rate, low-rate of college graduation, juvenile crime, teen pregnancy, local schools with D ratings and inadequate housing.



INTRODUCTION

The 2017 University Area Community Survey was conducted as a follow-up to the 2015 University Area Community Survey as a way to update community data in order to better inform future programming and initiatives. The survey sought to find the strengths and areas of improvement within the University Area community, and how the University Area along with partner organizations, CDC, businesses, and community residents can work collaboratively to continue improving the community. The survey allowed for resident input from the 33612 and 33613 zip code areas. Data was collected on the following categories: Demographics, Education, Employment, Transportation, Health & Well-Being, Children, Housing, and Community Safety.

SURVEY METHODS

DESIGN

In conducting the 2017 Community Survey, the University Area CDC sought to update community data gathered in 2015, while also obtaining additional information relevant to future programming and initiatives in the community. To achieve this, the survey was designed using the 2015 University Area Community Survey as a template, with questions added and/or edited as needed, specifically in the categories of Transportation, Children, Housing, and Community Safety. The 2015 Community Survey can be found in Appendix C.

The University Area CDC worked with the design team, made up of the Community Outreach Coordinator, Chief Programs Officer and Community Development & Engagement Intern to complete a draft assessment. The survey was presented to representatives from the Community Safety & Wellness Committee and Affordable Housing Committee, and edited in accordance with their suggestions. Community residents involved in the University Area Leaders Collective were then invited to review, test, and provide feedback. The final community survey consists of 53 questions and 8 sections: Demographics, Education, Employment, Transportation, Health & Well-Being, Children, Housing, and Community Safety. The survey can be seen in Appendix A.

SURVEY IMPLEMENTATION

A convenience sample was used in the implementation of the Community Survey. In an effort to gain as many responses from residents of the 33612 and 33613 zip codes, the survey was implemented between May 17, 2017 and July 31, 2017. The survey was only available in printed paper form, and it was available in both English and Spanish.

Survey participation was voluntary, and although strongly encouraged to respond to every question in the survey, respondents could refrain from answering any question(s). Completion of the survey was estimated to take approximately 10 - 15 minutes. As a thank you for their participation, respondents were given a re-usable shopping bag and a "coupon" that could be taken to the University Area CDC to be redeemed for a \$5 Target gift card.

The survey was publicized through a variety of communication channels including press releases, community listservs, local neighborhood organizations, flyer distribution and social media postings. Additionally, surveys were distributed and collected at community events by staff and volunteers, as well as delivered to partner organizations, businesses, and apartment complexes, along with implementation instructions. Completed surveys were collected by the survey team at the end of the implementation period.

DATA INPUT & ANALYSIS

Through a partnership with the Department of Anthropology at the University of South Florida, a codebook was created for data input pertaining to each question and answer presented in the Community Survey. Upon receipt of all completed surveys, data was manually entered into Excel for basic data analysis. The data set was then transferred to SPSS statistical software to identify relevant correlations.




Survey implementation at University Mall

KEY FINDINGS

A total of 517 completed surveys were collected. For the data in this section and those that follow, most percentages are figured based on responses from 517 persons (i.e. N=517) unless otherwise specified. Data marked with (*) indicates questions that allowed multiple response selections. It is understood that the survey is a tool for information, not a perfect science, due to the fact that it is a sampling of residents who were willing to participate. The following are highlights of the most prevalent findings. Response data sets for each question can be found in Appendix B.

DEMOGRAPHICS



- A large portion of people in the University ٠ Area are women
- The majority of residents in the University ٠ Area are in the "mobile/active" age range
- This is a diverse community, in both ethnicities and language
- A large portion of residents are single, and an even larger portion have children
- Veterans are a small yet present population
- Multiple communication methods should be used when disseminating information


CURRENT INITIATIVES





- Unless children attend Mort, they are bussed out long distances from home to attend school. This can limit their participation in extra-curricular activities, especially school-related ones. Aside from finances (and many other factors) school distance may explain why 80% of children are not enrolled in activities.





TAKEAWAYS

- Homeownership is extremely low in this community. Even if residents want to buy a home in the University Area, there are very few single-family homes available, and they are rarely for sale.
- Homes may not provide enough room for the household size
- While \$600/month rent may seem affordable, for a family with a household income of \$15,000, half their income goes to rent, leaving very little for other necessary expenses
- A large portion of University Area residents rely on public transportation

CURRENT INITIATIVES

- Harvest Hope Properties land-banking initiative to build affordable housing, as well as rent-to-own homes
 - Golden Palms and Golden Glade affordable housing apartments
- Financial Workshops through partnership with BB&T Bank
- Block-By-Block Model identifies needs in specific blocks and can assist in addressing housing issues; provides transportation resources





- The "community" statistic shows there is some level of resident interaction and connection already taking place. There is of course much more room to continue to build a sense of community
- There is a high presence of crime in the University Area, with drugs leading ahead of all other types of crime. Even so, the majority of residents feel safe in the community's public spaces.
- For the most part, perceptions of police are relatively positive. It should be noted, however, that "Police effectively deal with crime in my neighborhood" received the lowest number of responses out of all the questions on the survey.
